- Seasonal fluctuations in population














Lincolnshire - Mental Health Register (MH8) - 2006 - 2011




Lincolnshire - Dementia Register - 2006 -11 by Locality

SHINE & Managed Care Network

- The Managed Care Network is supported by the Mental Illness Prevention Fund, administered by LPFT on behalf of Lincolnshire County Council. The Managed Care Network can be described as a co-ordinated, managed and integrated network of groups and organisations providing preventative support and services to people with mental health problems.
- The <u>SHINE</u> Mental Health Support Network has been established as an independent, unincorporated association of groups and organisations interested in supporting people with mental health problems and their carers.







Mental Illness Prevention Fund

- Launched by Lincolnshire Partnership NHS Foundation Trust & Lincolnshire County Council in 2012, now in the 2nd wave of funding (£575k in total).
- Supports people recovering from ill health or experiencing problems for the first time.
- The fund invests in projects run by community groups and voluntary & other organisations.
- The first wave currently supporting around 33 community based projects to benefit over 1750 local people

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

How the Fund helps Managed Care Network members

Inspire

- Unique support package for young people aged up to 25 years.
- Short-term consistent support service that helps to socially support young people into the community
- Support to engage in a safe and familiar environment where they will be able to build on skills, self esteem and confidence to manage their own mental ill health







SHINE – Mental Health Support Network

- Connecting people with each other, with services and with resources
- Not a single organisation An association of people, groups and organisations
- Shared interest in supporting people with mental health problems..... and those who care for and about them
- No Wrong Door, Ambassadors, Newsletter, Inward Investment
- Currently 231 members











The Mental Health Support Network Aims

- connect people with the services & support that will most effectively meet their needs & enhance their lives
- connect service & support providers with each other to enhance efficiency & effectiveness
- secure & support the most effective use of resources
- promote positive mental health & combat social stigma
- support the web-based directory of help & social networking
- look towards investment in Mental Health attracting money to support people with mental health problems in Lincolnshire







Early Successes

- Shine administration has been established and LincsShine website is on track for launch in December 2012,
- Small group projects have been maintained / developed with immediate and tangible results (e.g. garden project, contact clubs)
- Some user-led projects have achieved significant progress (e.g. user-led social enterprise, and personality disorder project).







In numbers

- 33 projects involve approximately 64 groups and organisations,
- 30 separate groups & organisations manage the investment,
- 22 contracts over £1,000 and 11 small grants under £1000 have been awarded,
- 12 of the projects are county wide,
- 10 projects include an aim to establish, develop & support local groups (thus increasing both the number of beneficiaries and the geographic spread of projects),
- The initial estimate of the number of people who will be helped in Wave 1 is 1,750
