Some challenges

- Rural public transport network in many areas in terminal decline
- Declining services within rural settlements
- An ageing population. E.g. in Monmouthshire:
 - >65 forecast to grow from 24% to 37% by 2039;
 - >85 from 3.1% to 8.7%.
- Climate emergency: need to decarbonise transport and reduce absolute levels of travel

Some observations

- Huge diversity of "rural" contexts
- And huge diversity of people in terms of access to transport and travel needs
- Conventional public transport will always be a challenge
- Solutions:
 - Reduce need to travel by making more services locally accessible
 - Help communities to deliver transport services for themselves
- But
 - We need to understand more about travel demand
 - Need a radical rethink of how we organise and finance rural transport

Opportunities: improve access to services and amenities locally

- Expand services offered by village shops / Post Offices
- Mobile services
- Mobile 'Market day'
- Crowd-sourced services
- Getting on-line: e.g. on-line towns, digital health services etc.
- Community hubs







Opportunities: strategic approach

- Define and seek to strengthen a core network of bus and train services between principal service centres
- Provide high quality local interchanges supported by provision for onwards travel





Opportunities: providing community transport services

 Hayfield Sustainable Transport Limited provides 2 minibuses for use by community groups and succeeds by pooling demand.

 Oxfordshire CC offer minibuses used for school and adult social care services to communities / individuals 10-2pm every day.
