Timeline of 2019

RSN

- Launched campaign March 2019
- Called on Govt to produce Rural Strategy

House of Lords

- Select Committee on the Rural Economy
- Concluded there is a need for a Rural Strategy

Government

- Says no to strategy, but acknowledges rural areas face particular challenges
- Emphasis on Rural Proofing
- General Election December, 2019



Select Committee on Rural Economy

- Chaired by Lord Foster of Bath
- Report published 27 April 19 with a large number of recommendations for Government
- Received evidence from number of key rural organisations – including the RSN -Parliamentarians and communities

Lord Foster of Bath:

"Rural communities and the economies in them have been ignored and underrated for too long. We must act now to reverse this trend, but we can no longer allow the clear inequalities between the urban and rural to continue unchecked. A rural strategy would address challenges and realise potential in struggling and under-performing areas, and allow vibrant and thriving areas to develop further. Doing nothing is not an option."



What was the Government's response?

- Some positive elements:
- "Over the coming months, the government will expand on its strategic vision and set out how, working across departments and working with stakeholders, it is putting in place a range of measures to ensure that rural areas continue to thrive.
- The Government will work to improve rural proofing and DEFRA will publish an annual report on rural proofing
- The Government is reviewing Local Authority funding and has proposed including an Area Cost Adjustment to capture sparsity costs.



Government response to House of Lords Report

- But...
- The Government believes that rather than a distinct Rural Strategy, it is best to 'embed an appreciation of rural issues at all levels of delivery'- rather than "risk rural areas being placed in a silo through having a single rural strategy"
- It mentions that the 'UK Shared Prosperity Fund will allocate funding to those places with the greatest need'...will rural areas with their scattered geography fit into these categories?
- Government doesn't want to 'interfere' in other agencies or organisations responsibilities to force them to be proactive about rural areas and issues



Government response to House of Lords Report

- Defra will establish a Rural Affairs Board to support and steer work on rural proofing
- 'Final decisions are due to be made following the Spending Review – appears numerous times!!!

House of Lords Debate

What is the RSN proposing to do next to promote these issues

So what are we going to do next?

- RSN are developing a document entitled
 - Revitalising Rural, Realising the Vision
- This will be structured around the five foundations of productivity referred to in the industrial strategy (I.S.)
 - Ideas
 - People
 - Infrastructure
 - Business Environment
 - Places

It will also corollate to both the I.S Grand Challenges and national policy priorities (for instance Net Zero Carbon)

Revitalising Rural, Realising the Vision

 Emphasis on demonstrating how rural areas can help Government to achieve its aims

- Will also identify barriers to rural areas doing that and how these could be removed
- RSN will also flag up rural issues in new legislation etc.

What will we be considering?

People

- Training, apprenticeships and further education (including businesses' digital skills)
- Access to affordable housing
- Transport and access to jobs or opportunities
- Migration

Infrastructure

- Digital connectivity (broadband and mobile)
- Electricity

Business

- Local Enterprise Partnerships and Local Industrial Strategies
- UK Shared Prosperity Fund and business grants
- Access to business advice



What will we be considering?

Places

- Land use planning system
- Rural town high streets
- Accessible health and care services
- Sustaining village schools and other local assets
- Role of Parish Councils and community action

Ideas

- Sustainable farming and land management
- Decarbonising rural economies and communities
- Managing an ageing rural population
