John Longden, chief executive, Pub is The Hub

Latest COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECTS

All these projects have been opened with the expert help and a Community Services Fund grant from Pub is The Hub.

The Marquis of Granby, Granby Nottinghamshire

A new grocery store and coffee shop at the Marquis of Granby in Granby, Nottinghamshire, is proving a popular lifeline for local residents.

The pub is owned by wife and husband team Sara Barton and Sean McArdle, who also run the Brewster's Brewery at Grantham, and is run by manager Adam Purcell.

The Dragon Street Store and Coffee Shop were opened to support people living in Granby and the surrounding villages as it is a 9-mile round trip to the nearest supermarket and transport links are limited in the area.

The shop, which opens during the pub hours in the week of 4pm to 9pm and 10am to 10pm at weekends, offers a range of essentials such as bread, milk, cheese as well as its own Brewster's Brewery beers.

The coffee shop currently opens at weekends between 10am to 4pm offering coffee from local roaster 200 Degrees and cakes from Bristol-based baker Cakesmiths.

Sara said: "It has been such a challenging time for local people and the village store and coffee shop is proving to be such a lifeline.

"It is great to see members of the community come together for a coffee or tea and to socialise at the weekends."

She added: "We have had such great support and positive feedback from local residents to the shop. The brilliant thing is that we also have lots of customers coming into the shop from the neighbouring villages who are also without any local shop."

Pub is The Hub regional advisor Nigel Williams said: "Both the grocery store and coffee shop are much needed in this area which has very limited local amenities. The village store has been great in helping to support those living locally and the coffee shop is really key in proving an opportunity for local people to connect and socialise."



The Queen Inn, Brandeston

Suffolk

With our help and support The Queen in Brandeston, Suffolk has opened a village store, café and new community seating area to help local residents.

The pub, which is run by publican Caroline Aitchison, with her daughter Harriet and son Alexander, opened a village shop during the first Covid-19 lockdown and it proved so popular that it has become a permanent fixture.

The nearest major supermarket is over 10 miles away and with limited transport links in the area there were challenges for locals to get their essentials.

Part of a barn, which is situated beside the pub, was converted with inside and outside seating, to help bring members of the community together.

The store offers a range of essentials along with a specialist range of Italian and Spanish products.

Caroline, who has run the pub for the last seven years, said: "During the first lockdown when we opened a temporary village shop and we also delivered essentials and vegetable box deliveries to local residents."

"As well as helping our locals we have been able to support small, local suppliers."

She added: "Our local store became a lifeline to villagers so we have made it a permanent service."

Harriet added: "The new outside seating area and café offer is also proving really popular with the locals, many of who want to meet especially in the wake of the Covid pandemic."

Pub is The Hub regional advisor Terry Stork said: "This family-run pub is a real hub of the community. The village store has proved really popular with those living locally and is an important amenity especially for older and more vulnerable customers who find it hard to travel.

"The seating area and café is crucial in helping those in the community connect with others to combat feelings of loneliness and isolation."

In addition to the village shop the pub also has an ice cream parlour. It opens Thursday 10am to 3pm and 5.30pm to close, Friday 10am to close, Saturday 10am to 3pm and 5.30pm to close and Sunday 12pm to 6pm.





The Royal Oak Hotel, Beckermet

Publicans Rebecca and Joseph Richards have come to the rescue of local residents by opening a new village store at The Royal Oak Hotel in Beckermet, Cumbria.

The shop has been opened in a former pool room after the publicans took over The Royal Oak in March 2021.

The premises had been closed for two years, but was reopened after a refurbishment, with a focus on good quality food that is proving popular with diners locally.

The store is needed in the village as there are no other shops and it is around four miles to the nearest supermarket.

Many villagers rely on family and friends to deliver shopping as there are limited transport links too.

The shop, which opens between 9am to 8pm everyday, offers essentials such as bread, milk and local produce as well as takeaway foods such as pizzas and fish and chips.

"We have had such great support and positive feedback from villagers when we reopened the pub and introduced the new store."

Rebecca said: "It has been such a challenging time for local people and the village store is proving to be such a lifeline. Customers have asked that we start to stock meat products such as bacon and sausages so we already talking to a local butcher to broaden the range we offer.

She adds: "We have had such great support and positive feedback from villagers when we reopened the pub and introduced the new store. A lot of new faces have come into use the shop and we love it when customers stop for a chat, so we can see how they are doing."

Pub is The Hub regional advisor Malcolm Harrison said: "The store's opening has really helped Beckermet residents who now have somewhere to go for their essentials, takeaway food and also to have some of that much needed social interaction.

"Rebecca and Joseph have stepped in to help the villagers of Beckermet offering not just a village store but a great pub that a lot of support from those living locally."





The Bosville Arms, Ruston Yorkshire

Yorkshire publicans Sharon and Martin Hincks have opened a community café at the Bosville Arms in Rudston, near Bridlington, to provide a place for locals to meet up and socialise.

As well as offering a place for local people to get together the café also appeals to walkers, cyclists, parents and carers of young children as well as older residents in the village and surrounding area. It offers Italian artisan coffee, hot chocolates, a range of teas, including Yorkshire Tea, as well as cakes made by local business Ginger Bakers.

The café is open daily between midday to 5pm but there are plans to extend this with a breakfast offer. The pub also offers a pre-order service allowing groups to book in for breakfasts.

The community-owned pub had been closed for five years before being bought out by local villagers through Rudston Community Pub Ltd.

The Bosville Arms was the only community facility left in Rudston, apart from the village hall, as the village had already lost its shop, petrol station and post office.

"The community café is an important part of the pub in offering somewhere for locals and groups to connect and come together."

Publicans Sharon and Martin Hincks, who jointly have 27 years working in the pub sector, opened the pub in May bringing the local back to its former glory and making it the hub of the local area.

Sharon Hincks said: "The community café is an important part of the pub in offering somewhere for locals and groups to connect and come together. People are really enjoying the café vibe and meeting with old friends and new ones there too."

Pub is The Hub regional advisor Nigel Williams said: "This community café is really key in helping local people to connect and socialise, particularly after the lockdowns of the pandemic which caused many people of all ages to experience feelings of loneliness. The pub has already become a hub of

New Harp Inn, Hoarwithy Herefordshire

Publican Adrian Shaw of the New Harp Inn in Hoarwithy, near Hereford, has reopened the pub's village store to support local residents and tourists, after it was previously destroyed by flooding.

The store, which provides part-time employment for two people, was severely damaged by Storm Dennis in February 2020 just before the Covid-19 lockdown hit.

The storm also flooded the main pub building, which underwent a full renovation, reopening in August 2020.

The village store wooden structure, which was attached to the side of the pub, also needed a complete rebuild. It quickly became obvious how vital the store was to many people in the village who could not travel on the limited bus service to the nearest town for groceries.

The store offers a range of local produce and essential items including milk, eggs, bacon, tinned food, ice cream and pasta which it supplies to local residents in the village and holidaymakers at a local campsite.

"It was more important than ever to make sure this key social amenity remained for those living in the village."

Adrian said: "I have always been a supporter of Pub is The Hub and its great work in helping publicans to diversify their businesses to help local communities.

"We were devastated when the flooding destroyed the shop and we needed help to get this back up and running. The challenges of Covid-19 hit at the same time so we realised it was more important than ever to make sure this key social amenity remained for those living in the village."

Pub is The Hub regional advisor Roger Belle said: "Those living in the village really felt the loss of their local village store.

"Adrian had the backing of the Parish Council and many local residents who were keen to see this reopen. It was a privilege to help the people living in Hoarwithy to get their village store back."

Ireland launches pub diversification scheme

Ireland has launched a scheme to help to support rural pubs to diversify their facilities following the model of UK-based Pub is The Hub.

Its 'Pubs as Community Hubs' pilot programme is to be rolled out in five rural locations in Cavan, Kerry, Donegal, Clare and Cork following €50,000 in funding which has been provided to the Vintners Federation of Ireland (VFI) by The Department of Rural and Community Development.

The initiative is set to be expanded to other parts of Ireland if the pilot is a success. Diversification services will include community cinemas, digital hubs, book clubs, arts and crafts workshops and community meeting spaces.

The scheme has been modelled on the Pub is The Hub scheme in the UK, following lengthy support and discussions between VFI and Pub is The Hub.

The Minister for Rural and Community Development, Heather Humphreys TD, said: "Often people in rural areas might have to travel many miles to access certain services. In other instances, there may not be a suitable meeting place for local groups to come together for activities. "It is great to see Ireland supporting rural diversification in its pubs.

Through the 'Pubs as Community Hubs' initiative, we want to see how rural pubs can diversify during quiet trading times by acting as community cinemas, book clubs and meeting spaces for local community groups."

Ceo of VFI Padraig Cribben welcomed the initiative: "Pubs are a vital part of Irish life but as local communities evolve it's more important than ever to understand how our pubs can continue to enhance their offering to the villages and towns they serve."

Pub is The Hub in the UK has been running for 20 years and has helped over 600 pubs to diversify their services to help local communities.

Pub is The Hub, chief executive, John Longden added: "It is great to see Ireland supporting rural diversification in its pubs.

"Pubs with great publicans at the helm can be the heart of many local areas helping to offer vital services and combat social isolation and loneliness."

MEET THE TEAM

Nicky Harris, Pub is The Hub's Community Services Fund administrator



Nicky shares insights on the work and achievements of the Community Services Fund, including tips to publicans looking to diversify their pub's services

Getting involved with PiTH: Our chief executive John Longden heard I had a background in administration, having worked in independent schools for over 20 years, and after retiring I decided I needed a new challenge and joined Pub is The Hub in 2017. I oversee the Community Services Fund from project enquiries to payment of project grants. All projects have to be viable and approved collectively. I work closely with all advisors to ensure projects run smoothly and record information relating to projects so we can measure their performance, such as their social value.

The range of different diversification projects and their success stories are the best things about my job. Being part of the PiTH family is also good fun.

I was responsible for trying to obtain a set of racing roosters as a 70th birthday gift for HRH The Prince of Wales, who initiated the creation of Pub is The Hub in 2001. HRH had played the game during a visit to The New Inn at Llanddewi Brefi and our chief executive thought it would be fun to find him some for his birthday. Checking the roosters worked down the office corridor created a few laughs.

What advice would you give publicans thinking about diversifying their pub's services?

Be open minded and don't assume you know what your village wants. Always consult your locals as to the type of project they would support. Residents need to be committed to a venture to ensure they feel the loyalty to support the pub long term. The parish council and local authority need to be onboard too as they can help in many ways.

What are some of the other benefits to publicans of working with Pub is The Hub on Community Services Fund projects?

I have always maintained that the free advice and expertise of our 12 advisors is the biggest benefit of Pub is The Hub's Community Services Fund. Between them they have so many years of industry knowledge and are able to give valuable insights and advice to both experienced publicans and new entrants.

They are trusted and respected because of this independent experience. Free BII membership for a year, which is offered to all publicans at PiTH project pubs, is also very popular for business support.

The PR support that all new project pubs are given is also a huge benefit, as many publicans find this area difficult to navigate and often lack the appropriate contacts.
